Members are ...

- passionate about children's literacy
- willing to provide assistance to children, as well as lend support to their families, to help them succeed in school.
- kind, caring and patient. A silly side helps too!
- versatile and have excellent communication, follow through and time-management skills. The ability to self-direct, improvise and draw on the resources around you is important.
- collaborative; members need to work well individually and in a team setting.

Members agree to ...

- devote 450 hours of service throughout one year, beginning in the fall.
- be an active participant in their service assignment.
- attend meetings and events throughout their service year.

Members receive ...

- a \$2,949 living stipend.
- a \$1,250 educational award.
- excellent training and support throughout your service assignment.
- the opportunity to network and collaborate with friendly and talented people dedicated to transforming the lives of children.

Frequently Asked Questions

What would I be doing?

Literacy Corps members serve as a:

- Parent-Child Home Visitor, working with children and families at their homes or
- Family Resource Center Literacy Assistant, working with children in schools

Sometimes, members function in both capacities

Who decides whether I serve as a Home Visitor or Family Resource Center Literacy Assistant?

Once accepted into the program, the coordinators of the program assess your strengths and specifications and match them with a placement that best fits your qualifications. For both positions, your direct supervisors will be school district staff.

Where are the placements?

Participating districts for 2009-10 are East Ramapo, Ramapo Central, North Rockland, Nyack, Nanuet, and BOCES.

What would my schedule be like? Schedules have some flexibility, depending on where you are placed. Time-management skills are imperative to successful participation.

- Home Visitors work with school FRC staff to coordinate their schedules with participating families. Usually, hours are spread across about four days per week.
- Family Resource Center Literacy
 Assistants work within a framework of a school schedule. In some
 instances there are opportunities
 to serve in evenings or early
 morning, before school begins.
 Each school district has their
 own unique placements and
 scheduling requirements.

Both positions require regular check-in meetings at individual sites as well as with the entire Corps.
